1. What are the current Florida labor statistics and what changes were there over the month and over the year?

Unemployment Rates

- Florida's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate for November 2021 was 4.5 percent. This represented 483,000 jobless out of a labor force of 10,632,000.
- Florida's November 2021 unemployment rate was down 0.1 percentage point from the October 2021 rate.
- Florida's unemployment rate was down 0.9 percentage point from the November 2020 rate of 5.4 percent.
- November 2021 marked the fifth successive month Florida labor force statistics surpassed the pre-pandemic levels in February 2020.
- Note that the number unemployed is not the same as the number of individuals receiving Reemployment Assistance (RA) benefits. The definition of unemployed is those that are without a job, but actively seeking work. A person seeking work is considered unemployed even if they never held a job before. Collecting RA is not a requirement for being counted as unemployed.

Job Counts

- Total nonagricultural employment in Florida was 8,960,200 in November 2021, an increase of 485,600 jobs over the year (+5.7 percent). This was the eighth consecutive month Florida experienced a positive over-the-year job growth.
- Total nonagricultural employment increased by 51,100 jobs (+0.6 percent) over the month. This is the fifteenth consecutive month of job gains.
- In November 2021, private sector employment was 7,858,200, an increase of 470,000 jobs over the year (+6.4 percent).
- Florida's private sector jobs increased by 46,700 jobs (+0.6 percent) over the month. This is the nineteenth consecutive month of job gains.
- The November 2021 total nonagricultural and private sector employment have not reached the pre-pandemic levels in February 2020.

2. What industries in Florida experienced job growth over the year?

In Florida, all ten major industries experienced positive over-the-year job growth in November 2021.

- Leisure and hospitality gained 134,800 jobs (\$27,702 avg. annual wage)
 - Food services and drinking places (+98,500 jobs)
 - Accommodation (+32,100 jobs)
- Professional and business services gained 90,700 jobs (\$68,201 avg. annual wage)
 - Management and technical consulting services (+24,800 jobs)
 - Employment services (+20,400 jobs)
 - Computer systems design and related (+9,800 jobs)
- Trade, transportation, and utilities gained 85,800 jobs (\$49,378 avg. annual wage)
 - Food and beverage stores (+10,500 jobs)
 - Health and personal care stores (+8,400 jobs)
 - Couriers and messengers (+8,400 jobs)
 - Motor vehicle and parts dealers (+6,400 jobs)
 - Warehousing and storage (+6,300 jobs)
- Education and health services gained 52,100 jobs (\$55,093 avg. annual wage)
 - Ambulatory health care services (+32,800 jobs)
 - Social assistance (+7,500 jobs)
 - Hospitals (+3,400 jobs)
- Financial activities gained 31,600 jobs (\$84,238 avg. annual wage)
 - Insurance carriers and related activities (+14,200 jobs)
 - Real estate (+14,000 jobs)
- Construction gained 27,300 jobs (\$55,884 avg. annual wage)
 - Specialty trade contractors (+14,600 jobs)
 - Construction of buildings (+10,600 jobs)
- Other services gained 26,900 jobs (\$41,146 avg. annual wage)
 - Personal and laundry services (+15,200 jobs)
 - Repair and maintenance (+10,500 jobs)
- Total government gained 15,600 jobs (\$58,795 avg. annual wage)
 - Local government (+19,200 jobs)
- Information gained 10,800 jobs (\$93,327 avg. annual wage)
 - Publishing industries, except internet (+1,500 jobs)
 - Data processing, hosting, and related services (+1,400 jobs)
- Manufacturing gained 9,800 jobs (\$66,740 avg. annual wage)
 - Miscellaneous durable goods manufacturing (+2,200 jobs)
 - Food manufacturing (+800 jobs)
 - Fabricated metal product manufacturing (+800 jobs)

3. How do Florida's labor statistics compare to the nation?

- Florida's November 2021 unemployment rate of 4.5 percent was 0.3 percentage point higher than the national rate of 4.2 percent.
- Florida's November 2021 private sector over-the-year rate of growth was 6.4 percent, which was 2.0 percentage points higher than the national job growth rate of 4.4 percent.

4. How have Florida's metro area economies performed since this time last year?

5. What are the categories of unemployed individuals?

“Job losers” are those on layoff or termination seeking work; “job leavers” are those that voluntarily leave a job and then seek work; “re-entrants” are those that left the labor force and have rejoined to seek work; and “new entrants” are those that enter the labor market for the first time seeking work. A decreasing percentage of job losers as compared to the other categories can be interpreted as a sign of an improving economy.

National – Monthly

- Unemployed persons by reason for unemployment (as a percent of total unemployed), November 2021 for the United States (seasonally adjusted):
 - Job losers 49.1% (down from 69.9% a year ago)
 - Job leavers 12.5% (up from 6.5% a year ago)
 - Reentrants 31.8% (up from 18.4% a year ago)
 - New entrants 6.5% (up from 5.2% a year ago)

Florida – 12-Month Moving Average

- Unemployed persons by reason for unemployment (as a percent of total unemployed), 12-month average ending November 2021 for Florida (not seasonally adjusted):
 - Job losers 62.5% (down from 77.0% a year ago)
 - Job leavers 10.9% (up from 5.0% a year ago)
 - Reentrants 18.5% (up from 13.5% a year ago)
 - New entrants 8.0% (up from 4.5% a year ago)

6. What are the unemployment rates based on education levels?

- Unemployment rates by educational attainment, November 2021 for the United States (seasonally adjusted, labor force members aged 25 and older):
 - Less than a high school diploma 5.7%
 - High school graduates, no college 5.2%
 - Some college or associate degree 3.7%
 - Bachelor’s degree and higher 2.3%
- Unemployment rates by educational attainment, 12-month average ending November 2021 for Florida (not seasonally adjusted, labor force members aged 25 and older):
 - Less than a high school diploma 7.1%
 - High school graduates, no college 5.6%
 - Some college or associate degree 4.6%
 - Bachelor’s degree and higher 2.9%

7. What was the duration of unemployment in Florida?

Note: This includes all the unemployed/job seekers, not just the number of people receiving Reemployment Assistance benefits.

(Long-term unemployed (27 weeks and over) is the sum of 19.3 and 21.9, which is 41.2 percent, up 27.1 percentage points from a year ago.)

8. What was the full-time and part-time status of the employed?

National-Monthly

- Full-time and part-time status of the employed (as a percent of total employed), November 2021 for the United States (seasonally adjusted):
 - Full-time 83.3% (up from 83.0% a year ago)
 - Voluntary part-time 13.2% (up from 12.4% a year ago)
 - Part-time for economic reasons 2.8% (down from 4.4% a year ago)

Florida – 12-month Moving Average

- Full-time and part-time status for the employed (as a percent of total employed), 12-month average ending November 2021 for Florida (not seasonally adjusted):
 - Full-time 86.3% (up from 85.9% a year ago)
 - Voluntary part-time 10.4% (unchanged from a year ago)
 - Part-time for economic reasons 2.5% (down from 2.7% a year ago)

9. What was the latest Florida Consumer Sentiment Index?

- The Florida Consumer Sentiment Index level was 69.8 in November 2021, down 11.3 points from November 2020 (down 1.0 point over the month). Perceptions of personal finances now compared to a year ago decreased 4.3 points from 69.2 to 64.9 (down 4.9 points over the month), while expectations of personal finances a year from now decreased 7.4 points over the year to 84.2 (down 0.6 point over the month). Expectations of U.S. economic conditions over the next year decreased 15.0 points over the year (up 1.8 points over the month) to 68.3, while expectations of U.S. economic conditions over the next five years decreased 11.7 points over the year (up 2.6 points over the month) to 73.0. Perceptions as to whether it is a good time to buy big ticket consumer items decreased 18.3 points over the year (down 4.0 points over the month) to 58.3.

Latest Florida and U.S. Veterans Unemployment Rates, 2020 – Current Population Survey (CPS)

- Florida’s unemployment rate for Veterans (5.0 percent) was lower than the national rate (6.5 percent), and lower than the rate for nonveterans (8.0 percent).
